MS nurses with differing levels of experience collaborated to explore how they manage challenging conversations with people with MS.

In this plenary we will share the method and outcomes.

- How the use of guided reflection can help us to explore our practice and co- create appreciation and meaning
- Different strategies used to manage challenging conversations will be highlighted

14:45 Treating anxiety and depression (Distress) in Multiple sclerosis Rona Moss-Morris, Professor of Psychology as Applied to Medicine, Kings College London

I will show data highlighting why it is critical that we need to be better at managing/treating distress in MS. I will contrast traditional mental health models of anxiety and depression with understanding the concepts of adjustment and distress related to MS. I will present cognitive behavioural therapy treatment models specific to treating distress in MS and trial data on the efficacy of this approach. I will argue that we need digital therapies to be able to scale these treatments to people with MS who may benefit.

- Applying routine screening of anxiety and depression in standard clinical care
- Discuss ways to set up treatment pathways for distress in MS

Newly diagnosed: Impact of diagnosis and early escalation

The challenges of making an earlier MS diagnosis and red flags to an alternative diagnosis. Insights from the patient's point of view and potential challenges to supporting a recently diagnosed individual. A person-centred approach following diagnosis and initial DMT discussions. The importance of introducing early lifestyle adjustments and the importance of exercise.

- Enhanced understanding of the challenges involved in making the diagnosis of MS.
- Awareness of McDonald Criteria
- Red flags for differential diagnosis
- A greater appreciation of the psychological impact of moving from diagnosis to early treatment
- Importance of early exercise/lifestyle intervention

Psychology in the real world

This seminar will consider the topic of neuropsychological testing, exploring a range of methods and the origin of cognitive testing. Specific focus will be given to cognition in MS and associated impairments as well as cognitive testing in MS. Alongside this, a summary of simple psychological assessments will be shared as well as strategies to support patients with memory and executive dysfunction. We will also discuss when to refer on or what to do when no or little psychological services are available.

- Attendees will gain awareness of the history, methods, and assumptions underlying neuropsychological tests of cognitive function, as well as some considerations for their administration.
- Attendees will gain awareness of the practical assessment and management strategies for cognitive function in every day clinical practice

Seminar 4 Social determinants of health in MS

Social determinants of heath are the conditions in which people are born, grow, live, work and age. In this seminar we will discuss the impact of individual factors (such as gender, race, and ethnicity) and structural determinants (such as health-care access) on MS outcomes. We will include key updates on research in employment and domestic violence and abuse.

- Understanding the potential impact of social determinants of health on outcomes for individuals with MS
- Using screening questions in clinical practice (such as the Core-5 screening tool)

Although exercise is at the core of our practice, we know that many people with MS reduce activity early after diagnosis and that getting people with MS to increase activity is fraught with difficulty. We need to do things differently. Therefore, our aim is to challenge you to reflect critically on your current practice and consider what you could change. We hope to stimulate you to think creatively about how you can support people, at all levels of disability and stages of the condition, to become more physically active. Practical tips, scientific evidence, anecdotes, and the stories of people with MS will be integrated into this session to ensure it can be directly translated to your everyday practice.

- Understand the barriers and facilitators to supporting people with MS to become more physically active, and the evidence-based benefits of them doing so
- Gain practical tips, scripts, and creative solutions to help you support people to become more physically active

Seminar 2 Managing Intimate and Sexual Relationships with MS: Psychosexual Approaches and Clinical Discussions

This interactive seminar will focus on the importance of understanding the challenges of romantic and sexual relationships for people with MS. We will discuss how clinicians can broach this topic with patients and what support can be provided, both within the NHS and privately. Diversity in relationships will also be examined, as much of the current advice pertains largely to heterosexual and monogamous couples. There will be an interactive discussion between the session leaders and audience, reflecting on clinical practice and answering questions about care for patients and their partners.

Learning outcomes:

- To understand the diversity in experiences of intimate relationships for people with MS and the role of clinicians in managing sexual and intimacy difficulties
- To understand how to initiate conversations with people with MS about managing sexual and intimacy difficulties, including treatment recommendations and referrals

Seminar 3 Assessment and management of bladder dysfunction

This session aims to review normal bladder function and consider what is lower urinary tract dysfunction and how it can affect an individual's quality of life. It will include symptom assessment and consider basic investigations / examinations that should be performed. Red flags and referral guidelines will be discussed alongside conservative management strategies and health promotion advice. Core competencies, national guidelines and additional sources of information (for health care professionals and patients) will be reviewed.

- To understand normal bladder function and reasons for dysfunction
- To consider the basic needs for a continence assessment

This session aims to consider what is normal sexual function to then determine what is sexual dysfunction. It will review terminology, assessment and potential causes for sexual dysfunction. It will discuss how to introduce the conversation in a clinical assessment and consider changes to sexual function over time and with increasing levels of disability. It will review current treatment options available for men and women on the NHS and privately.

Demystifying the menopause

This session aims to provide an overview of the hormonal and physiological changes associated with the menopause and the impact that it can have on physical and psychological health. It will discuss symptoms assessment, health promotion and patient education and consider all the current national initiatives. It will also provide a basic overview on the different types of hormone replacement therapy and associated risks and benefits for women. Additional sources of information (for health care professionals and patients) will be reviewed.
